Executive Summary

Brighton College and Intellego Education are building a high-quality family of premium schools across continental Europe. The intent is to open schools in a number of key European cities, to complement both Intellego's existing schools, and the Brighton College group of schools. Brighton College Rome will open in September 2027 as one of the first three schools for this partnership. Intellego Education and Brighton College are seeking an outstanding, inspirational and ambitious Special Educational Needs Coordinator (SENCO) to join the founding staff of a brand-new school in the centre of Rome.

The academic success of every Brighton College pupil is founded upon exceptional, innovative and carefully crafted teaching, and upon our values of Curiosity, Confidence and Kindness. Coordinating special educational needs here means knowing every pupil on the register as an individual, knowing exactly what is being done for them and whether it is working, and treating excellent classroom teaching as the first and best form of support. The SENCO identifies need early, holds colleagues to a graduated approach of assess, plan, do and review, and expects provision to be evidenced and continuously improved.

The school will be both internationally outward-looking and rooted in an understanding of Italian language, culture and heritage, and parents should expect to see and feel an ethos of excellence throughout. In realising this vision for Brighton College Rome, the Special Educational Needs Coordinator (SENCO) will be supported by both Intellego and Brighton College International.

The successful candidate will combine deep professional knowledge and a genuine passion for inclusive education, developed in the UK and/or internationally, with an exceptional ability to connect with pupils, parents and colleagues alike. Pupils with additional needs are best served by expertise combined with warmth and precise challenge: the combination that turns access into genuine achievement. The post also leads the College's provision for pupils learning English as an additional language.

Previous experience of a school start-up, or a clear understanding of what is involved, will be beneficial. As a new school, we are looking for a leader excited by the opportunity of building a register, a graduated approach and a support team from the first day, in a community distinctive in its own right but with the Brighton College DNA running right through it. The successful candidate should also have substantial experience of coordinating provision for a range of additional needs, including able pupils whose difficulties are masked by attainment.

This role represents a rare professional opportunity for a leader who shares our aim of developing well-educated, respectful and intellectually curious young men and women, ready to take a full, active and positive role in the world.



The *Brighton College* Family of Schools

Brighton College was one of the first UK independent schools to take its distinctive approach to education to markets beyond the UK. From the outset of this international development in 2011, when Brighton College Abu Dhabi opened, its driving ambition has been to ensure each new addition to their family of schools is recognisably a Brighton College school. The BCI group now has schools in: Abu Dhabi (2011), Al Ain (2013), Bangkok (2016), Dubai (2018), Singapore (2020), London (2023), Hanoi (2023), and Bangkok Vibhavadi (2025).

Brighton College Rome will be one of three new continental European schools, with sister schools opening in Madrid (2027) and Lisbon (2028).

Brighton College UK

Brighton College – awarded the title of ‘School of the Decade’ by The Sunday Times – is consistently recognised as the UK’s leading co-educational independent school. Academic results place Brighton College in the top 10 schools in England, and in 2026, the school ranked No.1 in the UK for GCSE results (The Times).

In addition to the ‘School of the Decade’ award in 2020, Brighton College has achieved numerous other recent accolades, such as: Most Forward Looking School in Britain (The Week); Top School in Britain for STEM Subjects (The Week); Best Sixth Form in Britain (The Week); Top School for A levels 2025 (The Sunday Times) and Best 125 Private Schools across the Globe (Carfax Education). Brighton College international schools are also award-winning. In October 2024, Brighton College Bangkok won the ‘British International School of the Year Award’. Every Brighton College international school is a happy place, with a warm, inclusive and respectful community. They promote curiosity and a love of learning from the Early Years pupils, right through to the leavers at age 18. This is one of the reasons why Brighton College pupils achieve outstanding qualifications and go onto many of the world’s top universities.

Academic endeavour alone is not the full story, however, and exam results, excellent though they are, do not fully reflect the richness of a Brighton education. This becomes clear through meeting the pupils: all visitors comment on their confidence – the right sort of confidence – which arises from their being encouraged to participate in lessons and the co-curriculum; to take an active interest in, and involve themselves with, the community beyond the school gates; to learn to collaborate and show one another kindness and respect. The schools constantly stress the importance of kindness and encourage pupils actively to seek opportunities to demonstrate their commitment to this vital quality.

Brighton and Intellego share a common philosophy that all schools receive appropriate support, whilst also having the necessary autonomy to lead their school and ensure it works most effectively in its local context. In addition to support with quality assurance from Brighton College UK, there are numerous instances of further collaboration within our family of schools. These include professional development for teachers, pupil competitions, shared webinars and guest speakers. Pupils from across the family of schools are invited to participate in the Brighton College games, hosted by Brighton College Bangkok in 2027 and there are opportunities for senior school pupils to visit the College in the UK as part of their preparation for university and future careers. Alumni from every school are part of the Brighton College Connect network, with several thousand members.

About the Candidate

Key Responsibilities and Tasks

The primary, over-arching responsibility of the SENCO will be to lead the strategic development of special educational needs provision across the whole College, from the Prep years to the Sixth Form, and to be accountable to the Senior Leadership Team for its quality and impact.

The responsibilities of the SENCO will include the following:

Leading Provision for Additional Needs

- Maintain the College's SEND register and individual learning profiles, so that every pupil's needs are accurately identified, recorded and understood by those who teach them.
- Operate a graduated approach of assess, plan, do and review, so that provision is adjusted on evidence of what is working rather than left in place by default.
- Coordinate specialist assessment and diagnosis with educational psychologists, speech and language therapists, occupational therapists and other external professionals, including local services in the host country.
- Deploy, train and line-manage learning support colleagues, ensuring their time is targeted where it makes the greatest difference to pupils.
- Manage access arrangements for public examinations in line with examination body regulations, gathering evidence in good time and meeting every deadline.
- Work in close partnership with parents, ensuring they understand what provision is in place, why it has been chosen and what difference it is making.
- Advise on admissions, giving a clear and honest view of whether the College can meet the needs of a prospective pupil.
- Lead professional development on adaptive and inclusive teaching across the College, so that high-quality classroom teaching remains the first and best form of support.

English as an Additional Language

- Oversee the College's provision for pupils learning English as an additional language, from new arrivals with little or no English through to those approaching full academic fluency.

- Line manage the EAL teaching team.
- Assess and track English proficiency against a recognised framework, using that data to shape provision, group pupils and decide when targeted support should end.

Teaching and Learning

- Teach a subject discipline as required — the allocation determined by the postholder's specialism and the needs profile across the College — modelling the inclusive practice asked of colleagues.
- Act as an outstanding classroom practitioner.
- Promote excellence, creativity and innovation across the College's provision for pupils with additional needs.
- Undertake curriculum planning and delivery as allocated by the Senior Leadership Team.
- Ensure that the SEN suite provides a stimulating and interesting learning environment, with displays changed regularly and drawn from current classroom work.
- Uphold the highest standards of pupil behaviour, manners and appearance, and maintain current and impactful pedagogical approaches through a commitment to continuous professional learning.

Assessment, Reporting and the Wider College

- Undertake the preparation, delivery, timely marking and feedback of pupil assessments.
- Use target setting and assessment data highly effectively, aiming for each pupil to reach or exceed their target grade.
- Produce reports for parents to a high standard.
- Attend parents' evenings, Speech Day and school functions and events, some of which fall in the evenings or at weekends.
- Liaise closely with the Senior Leadership Team and other colleagues regarding any pupil giving cause for concern.
- Contribute to the College's extension and enrichment programme by running clubs and societies, and lead at least two weekly co-curricular options.

- Bring the experience and expertise needed to support pupils with applications to leading universities.
- Play a full part in the wider life of the College: staff meetings and INSET, appraisal and professional development, parent and pupil publications, and the care of resources and equipment.
- Any other reasonable management request.

Safeguarding and Compliance

- Contribute actively to the whole-school culture of special educational needs, pastoral care, safeguarding and pupil wellbeing, understanding and implementing the College's policies and procedures.
- Contribute, as a member of the College teaching staff, to preparation for inspections and regulatory reviews by local and international bodies, working closely with senior leaders.
- Address parental concerns and complaints professionally and in accordance with the complaints policy.

Qualifications, Skills and Knowledge

- Qualified teacher status, with a good Bachelor's degree and PGCE or equivalent, and a subject they can teach.
- The National Professional Qualification for SENCOs, or the National Award it replaced; strong candidates holding neither would be expected to work towards it.
- Substantial experience of coordinating provision for pupils with a range of additional needs, including specific learning difficulties, autism and attention difficulties.
- Experience of leading or teaching English as an additional language, and familiarity with a recognised proficiency framework such as the Bell Foundation's or WIDA's.
- A working knowledge of the UK SEND Code of Practice and its graduated approach, applied to an international context.
- Experience of supporting pupils with additional needs through GCSEs/IGCSEs and the IB Diploma Programme; managing access arrangements for those examinations would be a significant advantage.
- An international outlook and an understanding of working in diverse environments.
- The ability already to speak Italian is desirable, although language lessons will be provided for the selected candidate as necessary and on an ongoing basis.



Personal Skills

- A leader who fosters a passion for learning, with the ability and the genuine desire to develop pupils and colleagues to their fullest potential.
- An exceptional ability to connect with pupils, parents and colleagues alike, combining expertise with warmth and precise challenge.
- A proven track record of effective teaching, having obtained excellent public examination results with previous classes.
- The ability to work as effectively with pupils who need substantial support to access the curriculum as with able pupils whose difficulties are masked by their attainment.
- The ability to thrive in an intellectually invigorating environment; self-reliant and adaptable, with high levels of initiative.
- A colleague who exemplifies the Brighton College values of Curiosity, Confidence and Kindness.

About Brighton College Rome

Primacy of the Classroom - The Heart of the School

The school will engender an ethos amongst its pupils and staff where academic success stems from the development of a life-long love of learning and outstanding pastoral care, where individuality is celebrated, and where the importance of kindness is embedded within the school community.

The Italian language, history and culture is also central to the curriculum, where pupils participate in a range of cultural events and activities to further their understanding of, and respect for, the rich heritage of the country in which they live.

Prep School (Years 1 - 6)

In Key Stages 1 and 2, pupils follow the English National Curriculum (ENC), enhanced in line with our aspirational outlook and the Brighton College DNA, and modified to reflect the location and international mix of pupils attending the school. Pupils are taught by talented, enthusiastic class teachers, with a significant emphasis on English, mathematics and Italian language development. Specialist teachers work with children across specific subject areas such as drama, music, dance, art and design, computing and technology, languages, physical education and swimming.



Middle School (Years 7 - 9)

Pupils move into the Middle School in Year 7, where the curriculum is underpinned by the English National Curriculum and enhanced with the incorporation of many elements of the Brighton College DNA, such as Story of Our Land (integrated humanities), public speaking and entrepreneurship, while also continuing with the specialist subjects from the Prep School.

The curriculum is academically rigorous and designed specifically for pupils learning in an international community, whilst maintaining a strong local context. In Year 9 pupils also lay the foundations for successful transition to IGCSE, familiarising themselves with the specialist subject matter and terminology and making informed subject choices.

Senior School (Years 10 - 13)

IGCSE (Years 10 - 11)

On moving into the Senior School in Year 10, pupils begin the IGCSE syllabuses for which they sit the examinations at the end of Year 11. After the examinations and before the end of that year, pupils begin the transition to the IB Diploma, to familiarise themselves with its structure and approach to teaching and learning, and to enable them to be fully informed when choosing their Higher and Standard Level subjects.

IB Diploma (Years 12 - 13)

From the start of Year 12 all pupils enjoy the benefits of the The Diploma Club and Study. This special feature is a multifunctional space designed both for the quiet, independent study and relaxed social events appropriate for the school's senior pupils. It is also the base from which the IB Co-ordinator and Tutors provide academic assistance and university and careers guidance.

At the end of Year 13, pupils will sit their IB examinations and can expect to be well-supported on pathways to world-class universities in Italy, elsewhere in Europe, the UK, USA and beyond.

The Arts

Artistic endeavour encourages the pupils to be curious, courageous and original, and in doing so, enlivens and complements the academic life of the school. The school campus has performance and rehearsal spaces for art, music, dance and drama for pupils of all ages, in keeping with the educational philosophy that every pupil should be involved throughout their school career in the creative and performing arts.

Sport

Our 'sport for all' ethos supports our top athletes in addition to allowing all pupils to experience, enjoy and succeed in a wide variety of team and individual sports. The school benefits from both the first-class facilities on the school campus and access to a wide array of further sports facilities nearby. Our schools operate competitive fixture programmes, giving pupils the opportunity to participate in matches both locally and further afield.

Activities

Co-curricular activities on offer beyond timetabled lessons reflect the diverse skills, interest and enthusiasms of our community. - Indoor-outdoor learning and play areas thoughtfully integrated across the campus to enrich both pupil and staff experiences
- A comprehensive suite of co-curricular facilities, including a performance hall, music rooms, and dedicated studios for drama and dance
- Well-resourced libraries, with bespoke educational resources and equipment for all age groups
- A Design and Technology Centre and Digital Innovation Lab, incorporating modern product design and robotics.
- Extremely well-appointed urban campus sports areas including:
 - + several multipurpose courts including tennis, basketball and football
 - + an indoor gym

- Integrated partnerships with a range of other nearby sporting and cultural facilities are also being developed.

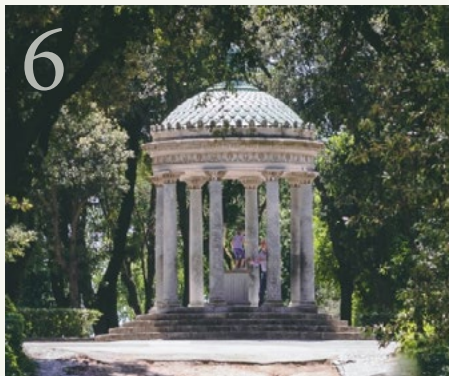

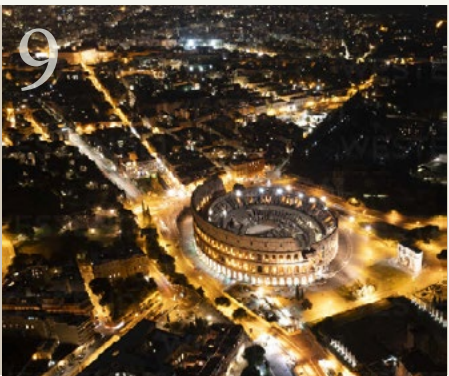


Nature
